Mission Statement

Rationale

- Road crashes are the major cause of accidental death of young children and adolescents in New South Wales
- Schools have the major responsibility for the education of students. Education can be an effective means of influencing the development of positive attitudes and safe behaviours in children and adolescents.

Definition

• The Road Safety Education Program is a program designed to develop knowledge, skills, attitudes and values of safe road use.

Aims

- To provide a Road Safety Education Program that will address the development of knowledge, skills, attitudes and values relating to road use.
- For the school community to work to reduce road trauma through a quality education program.

Implementation

1. Planning and Procedures

- Maronite College of the Holy Family will provide a comprehensive and integrated road safety program that will meet the needs of our students. The program will focus on the Key Learning Area (KLA) of Personal Development, Health and Physical Education. We will also identify other appropriate KLA's where road safety education can be included.
- Maronite College of the Holy Family will take into consideration the education needs and developmental stage of the students
- When designing our Road Safety Education Program we will take into consideration the local environment and actively seek to involve the community in improving road safety in the local area.
- In developing the Maronite College of the Holy Family Road Safety Education Program we will actively seek parental and community participation and support.

Management Issues	Operational Procedures in Place			
Outside the School Bou	ndary			
1. Pedestrian Movement	Students departing College grounds have one exit. Alice St exit takes the students to the front of the school towards the pedestrian crossing and is accessed from D Block playground.			
	Infants teachers are on the D block playground and the security guard is at the exit gates to ensure student movement to the exit is safe. A crossing supervisor manages the students crossing the road between the school crossing flags.			
	Students moving on mass at the conclusion of the school day are encouraged to use footpaths and not walk in front of parked cars.			
	Parents have access to ark in the Church carpark across the road from the College and assemble in the D block playground to collect their children.			
2. Bus Zone	There is one designated bus zone.			
	The primary students assemble in the primary hall in their designated bus lines, supervised by a teacher. The coordinator on duty gives teachers the instruction to board the waiting buses as they arrive.			
	The secondary students assemble in the Primary Playground outside the primary staffroom in E Block. Students wait for teacher instruction to board the waiting buses.			
	Senior students have been assigned as Bus Prefects who report directly to a Coordinator.			
	On arrival at school students disembark in the bus area. They proceed from there directly to the playground / classrooms.			
3. Bus travel and	Students who travel on buses line up before boarding the bus.			
Safety	Students are instructed on bus safety.			
	Parents are encouraged not to pick students up from the bus zone.			
4. Parent delivery and	There is one waiting area for students who are to be collected by parents/carers. The			
collection of students	Alice St exit waiting area is in the infant's playground.			

	Parents/caregivers are encouraged to collect them and take them to parked cars (holding child's hand).
	Parents are encouraged to comply with legal requirements at all times.
	Students being delivered in the morning alight from their cars and proceed into the school grounds. Parents are encouraged to park and accompany their children into the playground.
	There is an exit on Western Street which is accessed only by Students with a Disability with parent supervision.
5. School deliveries	Delivery vehicles are encouraged to drive to the front of the College.
	No vehicles are permitted on College grounds during school hours unless prior arrangement and proper supervision is provided for vehicle entering / exiting College grounds.
	College gates are locked in order to prevent entry during school hours.
