

HEAD OF PRIMARY MESSAGE

The use of Social Media and online safety has been discussed many times throughout the year. As we approach the longest break of the school year, I thought it would be timely to remind parents of the dangers associated with the online world. Technology is often an easy way to occupy a restless or bored child at home, but it is essential that all children are closely monitored when using any device, especially phones and iPads. Child safety

whilst online and the effects the amount of screen time has on a child's wellbeing, are two important things to remember when allowing children to use technology.

The eSafety Commissioner recommends seven steps to assist children when entering the digital world so that any risk they may encounter can be minimised. As parents or guardians, you should endeavour to always:



- 1. Be involved
- 2. Work with your child to set boundaries for screen use
- 3. Be clear about the consequences of not switching off
- 4. Set device-free zones and times in the house
- 5. Ask your child to explain their screen use
- 6. Use tech tools to help manage access
- 7. Lead by example

Staff Professional Development

Each week all teachers in the Primary Department participate in Professional Learning Meetings so that they can expand their knowledge and keep up to date with current educational practice. These meetings are paramount to ensure our students receive the targeted learning that they require and develop the skills of a 21st Century Learner. Our learning this week focused on the new PDHPE Syllabus which is to be implemented at the start of next year. This new syllabus aims at providing students with opportunities to enhance their own and others' health, safety, wellbeing and participation in physical activity. Students will also develop self-management, interpersonal and movement skills to become empowered, self-confident and socially responsible citizens.


Year 6 Graduation

Our Year 6 students will graduate next Friday 29th November. The day will begin with a special mass held in their honour, followed by the Graduation Ceremony which will take place in the Primary Hall. A reminder that the invitation to the ceremony is limited to two guests per family due to limited space.

Year 5 Science and Technology

This term, Year 5 students have been learning all about the 'Living World' which involved conducting a variety of experiments. This week's experiment focused on chemical reactions. Students had to follow a set procedure that involved mixing vinegar and baking soda together which caused a chemical reaction. Students were required to make predictions and then record their observations through the use of notes and labelled drawings/illustrations. The reaction created carbon dioxide gas that expanded up and out of the bottle and inflated the balloon.





Library Borrowing

A reminder that library borrowing has now ceased for the year. Can we please ask that all books are returned as quickly as possible so that the end-of-year procedures that need to occur in the Learning Centre can begin. This will ensure that all the books are back on the shelves and ready for borrowing at the start of the 2020 school year.

Uniform

As we approach the end of the year, it is important that students continue to comply with uniform expectations. This also includes having appropriate haircuts and wearing suitable accessories. Boy's hair must be cut in a neat and tidy manner with no steps or permanent parts. There should be no visible gel or hair products and the hair cannot be spiked up. Girls must have their hair tied up if it is longer than shoulder length. They are to use hair ties and headbands that are either navy blue or yellow. No student is to colour their hair. We would appreciate parent assistance in ensuring that the College Policy is adhered to by your child at all times. If you have good reason why your child is not in correct uniform, we kindly ask a note be written and sent to the class teacher.

Visiting Student Teachers

Throughout the year, MCHF welcomes student teachers from the Australian Catholic University to come and develop their teaching skills in a classroom setting. Whilst here, they are guided by their supervising teachers who assist them in leading small group activities and whole class lessons. This is not only a valuable experience for the student teachers but also for the classes they are teaching as well.

- 3. Slap on a broad-brimmed hat that shades your face, neck and ears.
- 4. Seek shade.
- 5. Slide on sunglasses.

Screen time for your child - 7 tips

There is a lot of conflicting advice and emerging research around screen time. But, the right amount of screen time can depend on a range of factors like your child's age and maturity, the kind of content they are consuming, their learning needs and your family routine. It can be easy to focus only on the clock and how long your child is spending in front of the screen, but the quality and nature of what they are doing online, and your involvement are just as important.

Consider your child's screen use in the context of their overall health and wellbeing - for example, is online time getting in the way of their sleep and exercise? Is it impacting on their face-to-face connections with family and friends? The answers to these questions will guide you and help strike the right balance of online and offline activities for your child.





1. Be involved

Sharing screen time and online activities like gaming with your child helps you gauge the appropriateness of what they are doing and manage potential risks. It's also a great way to start conversations with your child about their online experiences.



2. Work with your child to set boundaries for screen use

If you decide that setting screen time limits is right for you and your child, discuss these new rules with your child. Older children are more likely to cooperate if they have been part of the decisionmaking process. Colourful pictures or charts of daily limits and other important activities is a fun way to get younger children on board.



3. Be clear about the consequences of not switching off

Part of our role as parents is to set clear limitations and boundaries. The same applies to technology limitations so, being clear and consistent about the consequences for your child if they do not stick to these rules is paramount. The Raising Children Network provides some useful tools and advice.



4. Set device-free zones and times at home

Device-free zones can help you manage your family's digital use. Here are some ideas for setting digital boundaries within your home:

- no devices in the bedroom for younger children
- · all screens off in bedrooms after a certain time for older children
- · all screens off at least one hour before planned bedtime
- · all family members switch off at dinner time
- charge devices overnight in a place your child cannot access



5. Ask your child to explain their screen use

Get your child in the habit of explaining why they want to be in front of a screen or online. It's a great way to get them thinking about their own digital habits and balancing screen time with other activities.



6. Use tech tools to help manage access

There are robust products and device functions which allow you to see which apps are being used in your home and for how long. But try not to use these tools to secretly monitor your child. Instead, be open about the process and check the whole family's usage, including your own. Start with Google Family Link for Android devices or parental controls and Screen Time for iPhone/iPad.
