RATIONALE

At Maronite College of the Holy Family we believe that a road safety plan provides a framework of common understanding for students, staff, parents/carers and the community who interact with the College to provide a safe environment.

AIMS

To empower children and young people to be safe road users.

IMPLEMENTATION

Planning and Procedures

- Maronite College of the Holy Family will provide a comprehensive and integrated road safety program that will meet the needs of our students. The program will focus on the Key Learning Area (KLA) of Personal Development, Health and Physical Education. We will also identify other appropriate KLA's where road safety education can be included.
- Maronite College of the Holy Family will take into consideration the education needs and developmental stage of the students.
- When designing our Road Safety Education Program, we will take into consideration the local environment and actively seek to involve the community in improving road safety in the local area.
- In developing the Maronite College of the Holy Family Road Safety Education Program, we will actively seek parental and community participation and support.

Safety of students as they travel to and from school each day is important. It is expected that parents/carers, grandparents and family members will support the College through role modelling safe road use behaviours.

These include:

- Using designated footpaths or walking in areas away from the road
- Holding the children's hand (for those up to 8 years of age) and actively supervising all children as they walk to and from school.
- Teaching children to Stop, Look, Listen and Think every time they cross the road
- Walking with children to cross the road (do not call children across the road)
- Crossing roads away from parked cars
- Parking correctly in designated areas
- Getting children in and out of the car on the footpath side
- Using seat belt restraints for all passengers prior to driving away
- Waiting safely at bus stops and waiting until the bus has gone and choosing a safe place to cross.

		supervisor manages the students crossing the road between the

		dismissal times. Students moving on mass at the conclusion of the school day are encouraged to use footpaths and not walk in front of	
		parked cars. Parents have access to park in the Church carpark across	
		the road from the College and assemble in the D block playground to	
		collect their children.	
2.	Bus Zone	There are designated College bus zones. The primary students assemble in the primary hall in their designated bus lines, supervised by a teacher. The coordinator on duty gives teachers the instruction to	
		board the waiting buses as they arrive. The secondary students assemble in the Primary Playground outside the primary staffroom in	
		E Block. Students wait for teacher instruction to board the waiting	
		buses. Senior students have been assigned as Bus Prefects who report	
		directly to a Coordinator. On arrival at school students disembark in	
		the bus area. They proceed from there directly to the playground / classrooms.

Students are lined up in a traffic free area and escorted by an adult to the vehicle. e. A designated assembly area at the destination is pre-organised.

DRIVING TO THE COLLEGE (YEAR 12 STUDENTS)

- Students need to seek approval from the College to drive to the College. Students are required to approach their Year Advisor for the permission form. The form will be forwarded to the Head of Secondary.
- Driving to the College is only permitted for Year 12 students with written permission from the College.
- Driving to the College by Year 11 students is only permitted under special circumstances approved by the College.
- Students driving cars to and from the College should realise the serious responsibilities they take on and always drive in a legally safe and considerate manner.
- Students are not to provide transport to other students as passengers. Sibling passengers are only permitted with parental consent.
- The 'Permission to Drive to the College' form provides specific details about the permit conditions.
