MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL



This week, Primary staff became actively involved in R U OK? Day. This is a nationally recognised day of action dedicated to reminding everyone that any day is a good day to ask, 'Are you ok?' and support those people around us who may be struggling with issues in their life. Raising awareness, that starting a conversation with somebody could change that person's life in the most positive way, is the main aim of the day. Looking out for one another and lending support is an important life skill for all. If you ever have the feeling that someone you know or care about isn't behaving as they normally would, is perhaps agitated, withdrawn or simply just not being their usual selves, then it's time to ask, 'R U OK?'. A big thank you to Mrs Sleiman and Ms Rizk for organising and promoting this very important event. The students joined in the spirit of the day by assisting their class teachers in distributing secret tokens of appreciation.





Staff Professional Development

Each week all teachers in the Primary Department participate in Professional Learning Meetings so that they can expand their knowledge and keep up to date with current educational practice. These meetings are paramount to ensure our students receive the targeted learning that they require and develop the skills of a 21st Century Learner. Our learning over the past couple of weeks has focused on Purposeful Talk. Just like a Mathematics or Science lesson, student discussion within the classroom is carefully designed to develop specific academic conversational skills. This includes how to be an active listener, rigorous thinker and clear communicator.





Social Media

The inappropriate use of Social Media by students has been highlighted over the past few weeks. Although we

have explained the dangers of the internet and provided positive strategies to assist at home, we are still dealing with several issues arising from students posting inappropriate comments and images online. These incidents are happening at home but are unfortunately continuing to create issues at the College during the school day. It is a parent's responsibility to ensure they teach their child the dangers of the online world and monitor their behaviour when using any device, especially phones and iPads. Yesterday, Fr Danny spoke to Year 5 about the appropriate use of technology and how to make the right choices when



online. He also discussed various strategies that the students could implement that will help to prevent the wrong decisions being made. All students responded well to Fr

Danny's guiding words.

Making Maths Fun

This week, Year 5 were learning all about the cubic metre. To understand the actual size of a cubic metre, students in 5 Rainbow had to construct their own model. The students worked collaboratively in groups to produce one side of the cube. The sides were then combined to create a cubic metre. This hands-on activity allowed the students to visualise the size of a cubic meter and apply their knowledge of its attributes to estimation tasks.

Communication with Teachers

Just a reminder that all communication with teachers is to be conducted via phone or email through the Primary Office. Alternatively, you can write a brief note for your child to pass on to their teacher. This will ensure that any queries or concerns can be addressed promptly. In line with new health and safety procedures, we ask you not to communicate with teachers at the end of the day as students are dismissed.

Student Attendance

Student attendance has a great impact on their academic progress and social development. Regular absences whether for the whole day or part of the day, have a detrimental effect on your child's learning. Being late to school or leaving early also has similar effects to a student's academic progress. Please make it a priority to schedule any appointments outside of school hours to limit disruption to your child's learning. Collecting students early from school for reasons such as avoiding traffic, is not permissible. A reminder that any student absent from school requires a letter of explanation specifying the reason for non-attendance. More detailed documentation such as a doctor's certificate with the student's name, needs to be submitted for prolonged absence. This procedure is mandated by the government.


Keep Praying for Lebanon

Ms Pietak's eager Year 10 Science students have been investigating exothermic and endothermic reactions.









Message from Bishop Antoine-Charbel Tarabay

Dear friends,

Two days ago, on Tuesday, I visited the new Chancery offices in the Diocese of Parramatta. The invitation was extended by my brother, Bishop Vincent Long, after a letter I sent to him. The visit provided an opportunity for me to also meet with the Chancery staff for the first time.

I was welcomed with great hospitality and charity. I was also surprised to be presented with a donation towards the relief efforts in Beirut, generously raised by the Parramatta Diocese. It was a kind and compassionate gesture and I thank them for it. This money is going directly to our charitable work in Lebanon and is not tied to any funding for our Eparchy.

During the visit, we discussed the new Religious Education curriculum that is being developed in the Diocese. The curriculum is currently in the first draft, out of a 4 draft process. I understand that some parents have concerns. However, I am confident that a process is in place which will ensure that schools in the Catholic

Diocese of Parramatta will continue to deliver Catholic Education which inspires our children to Christ and teaches in line with our Catholic Church.

Despite some media reports to the contrary, the program does not teach gender theory or gender studies. As clergy and laity, we all want our teachers to be equipped to answer questions that the students ask them. That comes with formation and direction. It does not come with vilification. More importantly we want our children to be equipped for the questions that the world is going to ask them and in the end we want to have confidence that our children will go out into the world and choose Christ and give witness to him.

We will be afforded the opportunity to read and provide feedback on the coming drafts of the curriculum as they become available.

I ask you all to be prudent in your use of social media, your comments, your words and what you share. If you have questions, please direct them to the Diocese of Parramatta with charity, remembering that every staff member of the Diocese is worthy of our respect and should not be attacked or abused while they perform their job.

As we are closing this season of Pentecost, let us not forget the Scriptures we have heard in the Maronite Lectionary. Our job as a Church is to build each other up in love and to seek God's mercy in humility.

Finally, I assure you that I will not allow any teachings against our faith and Maronite spirituality or moral values in any Maronite school. Please remember that we are all working towards the same goal, that is to raise a future generation of saints, formed in conscience, equipped to take Christ with them wherever they go and to make a difference for a better world.

Dear parents and friends, we are constantly looking into ways to ensure our College environment remains a safe place for all to enjoy.
