



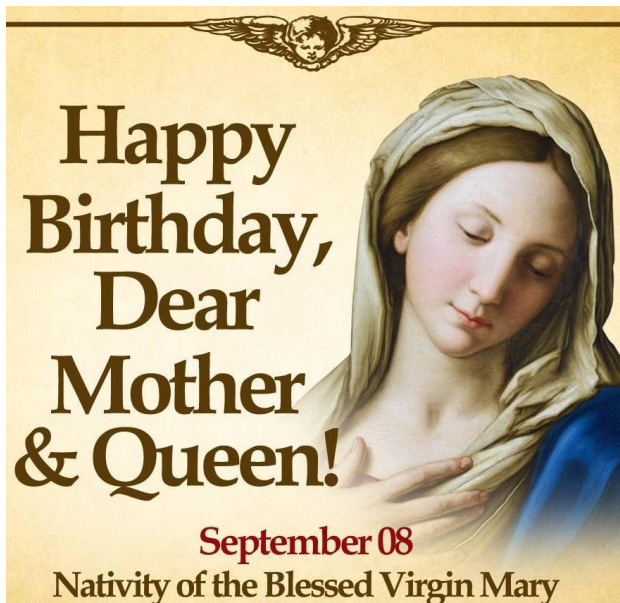

As announced by the NSW Premier, the College is currently working through the return to school road map. The plan will be actioned if the Parramatta LGA no longer is a hot spot or area of concern. Further details of the plan will be announced early Term 4.

Helping Your Child through Self-Isolation

Many children are spending significantly more time at home and are not able (or not choosing) to take part in out-of-school activities. Below are some ideas on how parents can help their child cope with periods of social distancing or isolation.

- Set a daily routine – Routines can help children cope with change and help them understand what is expected of them. Work with your child to develop a routine that suits the whole family and includes a range of activities, for example, schoolwork (literacy and numeracy), physical activity, creative play, family time and limited amounts of screen time.
- Maintain social relationships –Use technologies (such as FaceTime, Zoom or Skype) to help your child maintain contact with friends and other family members, such as grandparents. For older children and teenagers, it is important to monitor their use of social media accounts as excessive use can lead to increased levels of anxiety.
- Have fun – For many children, their out of school activities have been cancelled but it is important for them to stay active. Harness their interests and have fun with them at home (e.g., play football in the backyard or dance to music inside). You can also take this opportunity to spend quality time with your child by teaching them a new skill or game, read with them, or research a new topic together.

Accessing College Grounds

The College will be enforcing strict procedures for parents/guardians/visitors accessing the College grounds. All parents/guardians/visitors will be asked to buzz the College from the entrance gate where instructions will be provided via the intercom by the Admin Staff.

Family Phone Calls

Our Staff have been making many phone calls to all families in the College over the past few weeks. As many of our staff are working from home, the number might present as 'No Caller ID'. We will make a few attempts to reach out to check in with students and parents and be able to see how everyone is going.

Every Friday we will be having theme days to promote wellbeing and positive learning experiences. This week our theme was Odd Shoe Day!

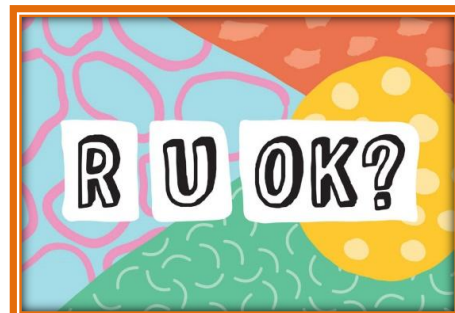

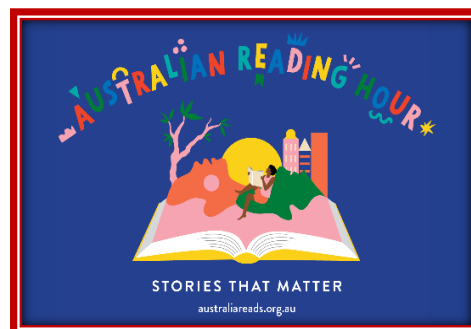


Reading Corner

For a reluctant reader, it is always a good idea to look for reading materials that relate to interests that your child enjoys, such as football or art. 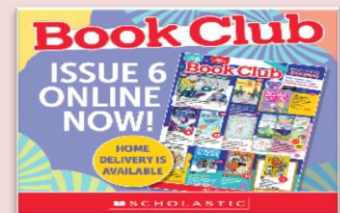

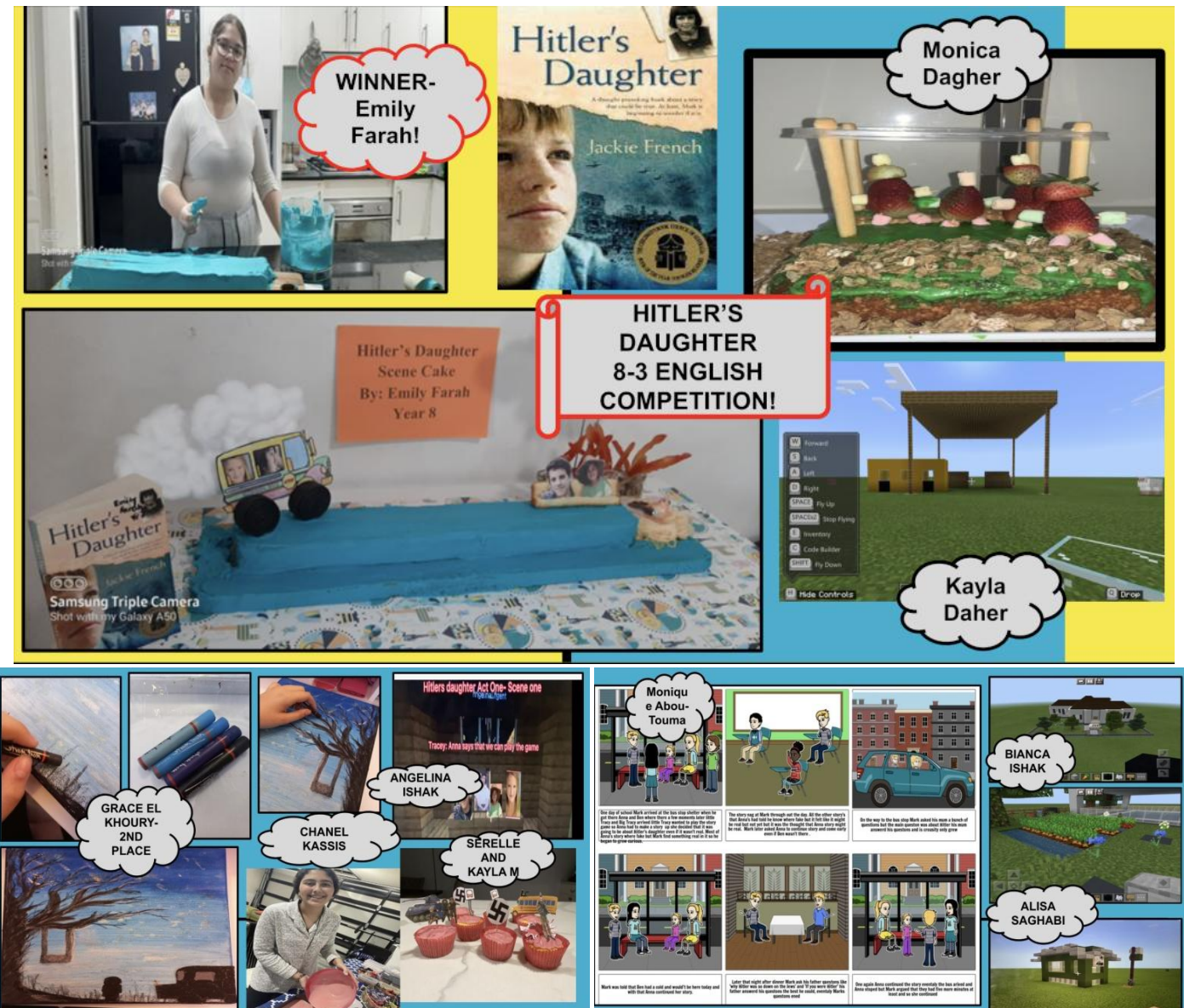

They have spent hours preparing their witness statements, cross examination questions, objections, opening and closing statements, solicitor notes, examination in chief questions and general investigations on how to win this case. The final score was 270 v 264 with the magistrate giving many elements a 10/10 for our students (which is rare).
